Celebrate Another Successful Year at the Cooperative with Fellow Members

United Power has made strides as an innovative electric cooperative serving members along Colorado's Front Range, but it may be entering the most exciting period in its nearly 85 years of existence. Early last year, leadership announced the official decision to exit its current power supply contract effective May 2024, and has spent much of the past year preparing for the upcoming transition, including receiving and reviewing proposals from potential power suppliers and debuting new member programs. All members are invited to attend the 2023 Annual Meeting on April 12, and join the cooperative in celebrating all its

accomplishments over the past year in pursuit of building a better electric utility and powering a bright future for you and the communities it serves. All participating members will receive an attendance gift. In-person attendees will be eligible for door prizes.

Voting in the annual Director Election also provides United Power members the unique ability to voice their thoughts on the cooperative's future. Each year, your votes determine who serves on the United Power Board of Directors. Your participation in the election is critical to helping the cooperative better serve you.

This year, nine candidates are running for election to the Board of Directors. One seat in the East, South, West, and Mountain Districts is up for election. The director candidates are Steven "Steve" Douglas and Robert "Rob" Masden in the East District; Jamie Klein, Ken Kreutzer, Katherine "Kathy" Mills, and James Vigesaa in the South District; Virginia "Ginny" A. Buczek and Thomas "Tom" Hogan in the West District; and Tamra "Tami" Waltemath in the Mountain District.

Balloting opens on March 13. United Power encourages all members to cast their votes in

the election. Members may vote electronically through their online account, or via mail ballots sent to all members in mid-March. Online and mail-in ballots must be received by 11:59 a.m. on April 11, or members can vote in person on April 12 at the meeting. Directors represent all members and are therefore elected on an "at-large" basis. This means members may cast a vote for a director in each district and not just their own. Directors serve in geographic districts to ensure adequate accessibility for members and to provide a representative cross-section of United Power's member base in the cooperative's governing body.

10,000 Rooftop Solar Systems & Counting!

United Power recently hit a major milestone with its 10,000th member rooftop solar installation. The amount of potential generation from these panels is approximately 58.5 megawatts (MW), a significant part of the cooperative's 600 MW peak.

The number is important for many reasons, especially when combined with the 175 batteries our members have installed, the nearly 6,000 electric vehicles (EVs) and plug-in hybrids being driven in our service territory, and 1,900 homes with controllable thermostats. Our members are taking actions to manage energy consumption and create electric power locally. This will be of increasing value for United Power as we transition to new power suppliers in May 2024 and as power markets come to the West in the next few years.

Colorado utilities, and United Power in particular, are ahead of the curve in energy transition. Approximately 4% of homes in the United States have solar systems, according to PV Magazine, compared to nearly 11% of United Power members. Interestingly, Colorado does not even make the top 10 states for solar penetration.

Of course other generation options are necessary to ensure resilience and reliability. United Power is blessed to have a footprint with abundant natural gas and wind resources which will continue to be a part of our generation mix. We are also helping our oil and gas members meet their own corporate goals through field electrification.

While other utilities are fretting – and sometimes fighting – over the impact on the distribution system, United Power has been planning for the

future. We have increased wire sizing in new construction and are carefully watching how well our transformers are performing while we work toward becoming a distribution system operator (DSO). As a DSO, we can take advantage of investments our members make and share in the financial benefits. Our Cooperative Roadmap outlines this new energy future and how we are preparing and enacting changes to lead the way in this exciting frontier.

I recently had the honor of being interviewed for an Energy Central podcast “Shaping a Dynamic and Modern Power Delivery Landscape,” in which we discussed the exciting changes happening in the utility business. You can find a link to the podcast on our website.

United Power has long led the way in energy innovation. The cooperative energized the first community solar farm in Colorado in 2009. In November 2018, we brought the largest battery storage facility in the state on line, a prestige it held until late last year. We added a smart thermostat program for load control and our EV charging program in 2022. This is all possible due to the amazing women and men at United Power, with support from the Board of Directors. You can hear more about our tremendous progress and our vision for the future at the Annual Meeting of Members on April 12. I hope you will join us.

National Work Zone Awareness Week

Recognized April 17-21, 2023

United Power would like to remind our members of the importance of staying aware when entering and exiting roadside work zone areas for both your safety and our crews' safety. Transportation accidents are one of the leading causes of on-the-job deaths nationwide.


As an electric utility, our work is fundamentally different from most highway construction work zones. When United Power conducts roadside construction work, it usually involves small crews working for short periods of time when compared to major highway and road construction. This poses challenges to keeping our lineworkers safe.

Major traffic construction will warn drivers in advance with signs posted hundreds of feet or even miles prior to the beginning of work. However, because of the nature of our work, our crews use different warning techniques when preparing for roadside work. Traffic cones are typically used to delineate our work, which are quicker and easier for our crews to haul and set up when working near roadways. Much of our electrical infrastructure is located in high traffic areas, such as shoulders, right-of-ways, intersections, and road medians.

To maintain high-powered electrical lines and equipment, our crews work in large vehicles, such as bucket trucks. When you see a United Power truck located on a roadside, remember to look for cones and signs that it may be a work zone. Slow down and move over when possible to give our crews a wide enough path to continue working safely.

Please try to avoid distractions like cell phones or changing radio stations when entering a roadside work zone, and be prepared for the unexpected.


Lineman Appreciation Day is Tuesday, April 18
